





KENTUCKY GETS BACK TO SCHOOL

A Look Across the Country

To Mask or Not To Vaccinate or Not

Gov. Andy Beshear said all unvaccinated students and adults should wear masks in classrooms and other indoor school settings and should require all students under the age of 12 to wear masks in classrooms since they are not yet eligible for vaccines. School districts wishing to optimize safety and minimize risks of educational and athletic, disruptions should make this a requirement. Beshear said, "There's only one right answer that protects the kids." He said a mandate is "not off the table." But he said he thought school districts would do the right thing before that was necessary. Beshear said the recommendations were one way to keep kids in classrooms this school year.

Across Kentucky, the more contagious Delta variant continues to drive a rise in cases and the statewide positivity rate, which hovered near 8% on Monday, July 26th, the highest rate since late February. Cases have been increasing now for four consecutive weeks after more than two months of decline.

According to Education Commissioner Jason Glass, the CDC and Kentucky Department of Public Health recommended school guidance includes the following:

"There's only one right answer that protects the kids."

- Prioritize in-person learning, encourage and promote vaccination.
- Masks should be worn by all people age 2 and older who are not vaccinated when physical distancing cannot be maintained. There should be at least 3 feet of physical distance between students in indoor spaces.
- Continue screening, testing, handwashing, respiratory etiquette, staying at home when sick and getting tested, contact tracing in combination with quarantine and isolation, and cleaning and disinfection efforts.

The Department of Public Health guidance says that schools should "consider universal use of masks for all persons" based on several community factors. With vaccinations among adults stalling, the delta variant is a much more transmissible version of the COVID-19 virus and transmission levels in our communities are on a troubling rise. Because of this reality, you have a responsibility to take the steps necessary to get your schools open safely for operations this fall."

SAN FRANCISCO, CA will require state employees and all health care workers to show proof of COVID-19 vaccination or get tested weekly as officials aim to slow rising coronavirus infections, mostly among the unvaccinated. About 62% of all eligible Californians are fully vaccinated

SAVANNAH, GA – The largest city on Georgia's coast has reimposed a requirement that people wear masks in public, citing a "steep and alarming rise" in COVID-19 cases. Statewide case rates in Georgia are almost five times as high as they were in late June.


ST. LOUIS, MO – Mask mandates took effect again in the St. Louis area amid a sharp increase in COVID-19 cases spurred by the delta variant. Masks now are mandatory in indoor public places and on public transportation for everyone age 5 or older – even for those who are vaccinated.

JACKSON, MS - "Our positivity rate is now the same as it was during the worst of COVID-19 in January. Delta is hitting hard," the Mississippi State Department of Health stated. Gov. Tate Reeves lifted all mask mandates months ago.

ORLANDO, FL. – The mayor of the county that hosts Florida's theme park mecca said that "we are in crisis mode" when it comes to dealing with soaring numbers of COVID-19 infections. Now the home to Walt Disney World and Universal Orlando Resort is seeing about 1,000 new cases a day, said Orange County Mayor Jerry Demings. Despite this latest surge, Gov. Ron DeSantis said Florida will not return to government mandates. Demings said he hasn't ruled out reintroducing mask rules for the county.

WASHINGTON, DC - The United States served notice Monday that it will keep existing COVID-19 travel restrictions on international travel in place for now due to concerns about the surging infection rate because of the delta variant. The rising cases also are causing the administration to take a closer look at policies on wearing masks.

As of Sunday, July 25th, 69% of American adults had received one vaccination shot, according to the CDC – still slightly below the 70% goal Biden had set for July 4. Sixty percent of Americans have been fully vaccinated.





Women's Equality Day

Women's Equality Day is meant to commemorate the day when the 19th amendment was passed in 1920 giving women the right to vote. It also is a day to look back on all women's rights issues and progress. It is celebrated each year on August 26th. This is a United States holiday. It is typically celebrated by government, educational, and women's organizations.

Susan B. Anthony founded the National Women's Suffrage Association in 1869 in order to organize the fight for the right to vote. The amendment to the US Constitution to allow women to vote was first proposed in 1878, but it took many years until it was finally passed. On August 26, 1920 the 19th amendment became a part of the US Constitution and women were permitted to vote.

In 1971, Congresswoman Bell Abzug introduced legislation to Congress for an official Women's Equality Day. It soon passed and the day became an official holiday.

Interesting Fact: There are actually still 15 states that have not ratified the 19th amendment.



The Kentucky State Fair is the official state fair of Kentucky which takes place at the Kentucky Exposition Center in Louisville. More than 600,000 fairgoers fill the 520 acres of indoor and outdoor exhibits; activities include sampling a wide variety of food and riding several roller coasters during the 11-day event. The Kentucky State Fair includes competitions in crafts such as quilt-making, homebrew beers, and home-made pastries, as well as fine arts and agricultural competitions. The fair was organized in 1816 and moved from city to city until 1907, when Louisville became the fair's permanent home. The fair moved to its current site at the Kentucky Exposition Center in 1956.

Health Note: Dental Hygiene



Dental Hygiene refers to the practice of keeping the mouth, teeth, and gums clean and healthy to prevent disease.

You can keep your teeth for your lifetime. Here are some things you can do to maintain a healthy mouth and strong teeth.

- Drink fluoridated water and brush with fluoride toothpaste
- See your dentist at least once a year, even if you have no natural teeth or dentures
- See your dentist if you have sudden changes in taste and smell
- Practice good oral hygiene by brushing twice a day and flossing daily between the teeth to remove dental plaque.
- If your diabetic, work to maintain control of the dis-

ease. This will decrease the risk for other complications, including gum disease (which is an infection caused by bacteria under the gum tissue that began to destroy the gums and bone)

- Signs of gum disease
 - 1) red, swollen, or bleeding gums
 - 2) gums pulling away from the teeth or sores on the gums
 - 3) loose teeth or changes in bite or tooth position
 - 4) bad breath

Do not use any tobacco products. if you do STOP

Limit alcohol drinks as well.

If you are a caregiving, help the older adults to brush and floss their teeth especially if they cannot do this independently.
